## Fast Facts! The Wedge- Tailed Eagle

Australia's largest raptor, the wedge-tailed eagle (*Aquila Audax*), feeds primarily on rabbits and hares — which is excellent news for Australian native wildlife! This predator is native to the Australian mainland, Tasmania and Southern New Guinea. They are found from sea level to alpine regions in the mountains, and have a great eye for real estate; building their nest with a good view of the surrounding countryside. They eat both carrion and live animals, and when they work in a group, they can kill animals as large as adult kangaroos! They are monogamous and reportedly mate for life.





### Wedge-Tailed Eagle facts:

- The name *Aquila Audax* translates from Latin to the “Bold Eagle,” which is a very true reflection of this magnificent bird’s hunting ability.
- They can fly for up to 90 minutes at a time, and reach heights of over two kilometres.
- This species is considered to be the world’s most common large eagle.
- Wedge-tailed eagles feature in many dream time stories for Indigenous Australians: the eagle Bunjil is an important creator being for the Kulin people of central Victoria. In the Adelaide plains, the Kurna people believe the eagle’s claw takes the form of a constellation known as Wilto (the Southern Cross).



Wedge-tailed eagles are named for their long, diamond-shaped tail, and can have a wing span of up to 2.8 metres.



Wedge-Tailed Eagles are found almost right across Australia - highlighted in orange.
